

**'Person A Pioneer In Old-Age Pension Work'**

Fred G. Dewey, prominent Detroit attorney and former president of the Detroit Bar Association, came out for Senator Seymour H. Person in a radio speech over WIBC Thursday night, to succeed Grant M. Hudson for Congressman from the Sixth District.

Mr. Dewey reviewed Senator Person's life and career from the days when they were students in the law school of the University of Michigan.

"Perhaps the best illustration I can give of the kind of law-making that appeals to Seymour Person is the movement for Old Age Pensions. When he was first a member of the Legislature 15 years ago we supposed that old age pension legislation was a necessity in the Old Country, for example in Germany and in England, where such laws existed, but that it was not needed in a prosperous country like ours.

"We have learned a good deal in this country in the last 15 years, and forward-looking men and women have come to realize that when a worker has crossed the top of the hill and is descending the long slope on the other side, the time may very likely come when he needs a sustaining hand—not charity—but that it is the duty of the State to protect workers and that government should stabilize society and assure the independence of labor in its declining years.

"Seymour Person was one of the pioneers of this movement in Michigan. He has seen 30 percent of the states adopt old age pension legislation, and we are now at the point in this commonwealth where the governor has appointed a commission to draft a model law and in my judgment the next time the legislature meets this great, constructive work will be enacted into the law.

"In Senator Person we have a man who was born in the Sixth District and has lived there all his life; who is not only qualified as I have said before, to take a seat in Congress, but who has the intelligence and courage to speak the truth and to go to Washington—and it looks now as though he will unquestionably be sent there—with the express promise to use his talents to make law respected and to restore to popular government the dignity and authority it should have."
