Farmington Department Answers Several Calls During Past Week

Grass fires kept the Farmington fire department on the move during the past week, one threatening two homes, and the other sweeping over the wide reaches of rolling land north and east of McGee Hill. A third threatened orchards and buildings of Floyd Howard at West Farmington.

The firemen were called to a blaze near the home of John Fitzpatrick Thursday morning; when a bonfire got beyond control. At one time the flames burned within ten feet of the Fitzpatrick residence, and before the firemen returned, the garage at the home of A. C. Worsfold, owned by Charles Samson, was endangered.

On Saturday the north end of town was covered with smoke from a huge grass fire between Ten Mile road and McGee Hill. The fire swept over the entire area in less than half an hour, wind blowing the flames 10 feet high at times.

A grass fire that started Tuesday afternoon in the vicinity of the recently-raided Workers' Camp near Twelve-Mile and Halsted roads, spread rapidly to the southwest toward Floyd Howard's orchard and nearby buildings. Farmers and the Farmington department answered the call and beat out the flames before any damage was done.

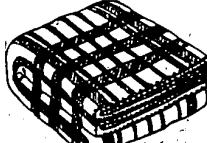


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
