

STANDS IN LINE OVER TWO HOURS WITH BALLOT-BOX

Recount On Governorship At Lansing Means Trying Time For Michigan Clerks

Standing in line for over two hours, part of the time in a dark passageway, was only part of the experience reported by City Clerk N. H. Power of Farmington when he returned Friday evening after taking the City ballot-box to Lansing for Michigan's first recount in a governorship contest. Automobiles were so numerous near the building, Mr. Power reported, that it was impossible to get close to the place. Although three men were receiving boxes, the line moved forward but a foot or two at a time, each clerk carrying his box that distance. Finally, city and township clerks turned over their keys to 83 weary county clerks, among them, of course, Burton P. Daugherty of Oakland County.

Some of the ballot-boxes, Mr. Power said, "must have been in Noah's Ark." They were of all kinds of wood, shapes, and sizes, and in greatly varying states of preservation. Farmington's was the best-looking box he saw in Lansing, Mr. Power said.

situation, haste being necessary in order to have the work completed before the concrete-laying machine gets inside the city limits. It is expected that the work will be started within a week, and that the cost will be about \$3,000.

Uncover Pipe
 First intimation that lowering would be necessary was given when the graders uncovered the water-pipe east of the Junction, which serves the Children's Hospital of Michigan. It was quickly seen that the remainder of the piping as far west as the point where the road drops, just east of the bridge, would have to be put down deeper.

After consultation with the engineers, George H. Ruhling and Co., the Commission decided the present mains are so old that it would not pay to go to the trouble of moving them, which would probably be fully as much as the cost of laying new mains. It was decided to lay a six-inch main on the south side of the road, between the curb-line and the edge of the right-of-way on the south side, leaving also enough room for sewer installation if it is desired later on.

The work will require 1,700 feet of pipe, and it is expected that the cost will be about \$3,000. Bids will be received Friday evening for the work.

Special meetings were held Tuesday and Wednesday evenings by the Commission to discuss the question.

To Hang 'Stop' Sign West Of Main Corner

A sign instructing eastbound motorists on Grand River to stop before turning into Farmington road will be hung upon a post west of the crossing within a few days.

The instructions painted on the pavement have failed completely to make the drivers stop, and many vehicles still turn the corner at 25 miles an hour and upward. A Farmington resident narrowly escaped being run down at the corner a few days ago.
