FUNERAL SERVICE ON SATURDAY FOR WM. F. MITCHELL

Father Of Mrs. D. F. Fleming Expires Suddenly After Stroke; Lived Here Seven Years

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon for William F. Mitchell, father of Mrs. D. F. Fleming, and Mrs. Jess Howard of Farmington. Mr. Mitchell died suddenly at the Fleming residence Wednesday morning.

Mr. Mitchell, who was 78 years old, suffered a stroke while dressing and died within an hour. He had been ill for a long time with a foot infection, which left him in a weakened condition.

Services will be held at the Bird and Mott Undertaking parlor at 2867 West Grand Boulevard in Detroit at 2:00 o'clock Saturday, followed by burial at Evergreen Cemetery. At the cemetery there will be a Masonic service in charge of Detroit lodge No. 2. Mr. Mitchell's membership in that lodge would have reached 40 years within a few months.

Mr. Mitchell had lived at the Fleming residence since the family moved to Farmington seven years ago. He is survived by two daughters besides Mrs. Fleming and Mrs. Howard, Mrs. John C. Orr of Detroit and Mrs. Grover Smith of Columbus, O.; a son, Edward, and a brother David, of Pittsburgh, Pa.
