SOUTHFIELD MAN, SISTER, IN AUTO CRASH; ONE HURT

Clara Haps Suffers Broken Ankle When Car Hits Safety Zone Post

Crowded by a large auto in evening traffic Friday, Chadwick Haps, of Southfield Community Driving in his car on Woodward avenue, crashed into a safety zone post in order to avoid hitting a pedestrian. The front of his sedan was completely demolished. Chadwick escaped unhurt, but his sister, Clara, who rode with him, sustained a broken nose and dislocated ankle. She was taken to Herman Kiefer Hospital for first aid and later to the Redford branch of Receiving Hospital for further treatment and then to her home on 9-Mile and Seminole.
