are 69 fully organized Presbyterian churches. Twenty-six of these are young churches which are under the care of the Presbyterian Board of Church Extension, of which Dr. M. C. Pearson is secretary. This Board seeks to "mother" all these young churches, giving them financial aid, suggestions as to programs, assistance of helpful speakers, and such other assistance as may be needed. The Board feels that West Point Park furnishes a fine center for the building up of a strong Presbyterian church. It should accommodate all Presbyterians and others living within a radius of five miles of the church.

Now that the church has a young wide-awake resident pastor, it is the hope of the Board that all Presbyterian families in the community attend the services and may send their names and addresses to Rev. Adams and give him an opportunity to visit and to serve them in any way he can.

### Plan Special Meetings

In addition to the regular meetings of the church, Rev. Adams plans to have many special fellowship meetings during the winter, with speakers of note from Detroit. The work among the children and young people will be made very helpful. New hymnals have recently been furnished. New pulpit furniture will be added. Some fine musical services will be provided, and this church in every way will become a great place of inspiration and helpfulness. The church is officered with very capable men and women who are devoting their best to make the church grow.

In all these efforts, the church has the hearty co-operation of the Board of Church Extension whose members are very solicitous for the material and spiritual welfare of this growing church.

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
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
