UNION VET SENDS POEM HE WROTE FOR 'BOY IN GRAY'

W. H. Wileand Recalls School Days, Holds Years In Farmington Dearest

Mrs. William Irish of Farmington recently received a letter from W. H. Wileand, Civil War veteran who taught school sixty years ago in Farmington, enclosing a poem which he wrote on "the Blue and the Gray." In writing to Mrs. Irish, Mr. Wileand, who resides in Coldwater and is well known to many Farmington residents, recalls his teaching days in Farmington, saying: Dear Little Girl,

I can hardly think of you grown up, so you must pardon the term, and think only of the time long ago when Martha and you and curly-haired little Dolly Wileand were such favorites with the old teacher, but though I taught school so long, memory now dwells longest on the faces of my Farmington boys and girls, and that reunion to be a bright spot in a long, long time. You must go a long ways from home a long time to understand how dear such a meeting can be.

"I am enclosing a copy of some verse I wrote 17 years ago to an old Johnny Reb I met at the G. A. R. encampment in Chattanooga. He was six years older than I and served in the Confederate army four years. He was a Mississippian, and his Southern too pronounced to ever forget. We stayed at the same house, and he had come up, he said, to see the Yanks. A teacher and a preacher, quite well-educated, he made excellent company for me and the Southern family certainly made me feel 'at home'."
