payroll \$19,080 per year and doing away with all motor car expenses amounting to \$84,685 or a total decrease of 12.5 per cent, or \$83,715."

Salaries Actually More

The result is actual increase. In September the Board of Auditors stated that they had already, before the Supervisors convened, cut down salaries \$19,080 per year. Then after a month of wrangling and inquiry and research and hearing department heads, the net salary saving for 1931, as compared to 1930 is to be only \$8,438. So that in adopted by the Auditors' final recommendations for 1931 salaries on October 21, the Board of Supervisors seems to have increased salaries over \$10,000.

Want Debt Inquiry

Another matter that the taxpayers' association asks to have

investigated is the County's bonded indebtedness. The bank report as of September 8, 1930 shows the bonded indebtedness of the County for drains and bonds, to be \$16,425,000. The total assessed valuation of the County is \$490,000,000. The State Constitution, Article Eight, Section Twelve, says that the bonded indebtedness of a County shall not be greater than three per cent of its total valuation.
