Maine-to-Newfoundland Route to Join First Telephone Cable to Be Laid to Europe

Although the actual laying of the world's first transatiantic telephone cable will not take place until the summer of 1932, when it will be stretched along the ocean bed for 1800 nantical miles from the eastern coast of Newfoundland to the western coast of Ireland, construc-tion of the landward end of the circuit on this side of the water is making rapid progress. Right-of-way is being purchased and cleared, and poles are being set, and aland poiss are owing see, and arready some wire has been placed along the route of about 860 miles from the Maine-New Brunswick border to the final jumping-off spot in the vicinity of Trinity Bay.

Transoceant telegraph cables cannot transmit the human voice, because of the great attenuation of the electrical impulses over long distances in this type of cable. The present transatiantic telephone service is furnished by radio circuits, in connection with land lines at either end.
