'CLOISTER AND THE HEARTH' REVIEWED AT WOMAN'S CLUB

Members Enjoy Discussion Of Read's Life By Miss Katherine Sprague

The Lloyd Gullen home was the scene of the November 19th meeting of Farmington Woman's club.

With an attendance taxing the ground floor of the residence the business session was summarily dispatched so as to allow ample time for the outstanding treat of the year, a book review by Miss Catherine Sprague. Miss Ruth Tuttle read a splendidly arranged paper on the life of the author, Charles Reade.

The review of "The Cloister and the Hearth" was a cleverly planned and fascinating word-picture of life in early Holland when with her shining tiled floors she was teaching the world how to be clean; for the Hollanders were always an original and leading people. They claim to have invented printing (wooden type), oil-painting, liberty, banking, and gardening.

At this time, the middle of the fifteenth century, Louis XI was sovereign of France Edward IV having annexed Wales by the "coup de etat" of sending his

queen to a castle in Wales for the birth of his oldest son thus providing the Welsh with a live "Prince of Wales," and Philip "The Good" having dispossessed his cousin Jacqueline was encouraging the divine arts of goldsmiths, silversmiths jewelers and craft of design and facture by staging a great feast for the competitors for the prizes in the arts, at Rotterdam.

During the hour and a half required to depict the life and love of that stern age Miss Sprague's fine voice and rare mind held her entire audience in that all carried away a reverence for all these countries and their special types of civilization.
