New Regulation Would Permi Sale Of Only Pasteurized And Certified Milk

A new milk ordinance, which would prohibit the sale in the dity of Farmington of any but pasteurized or certified milk. was presented to the City Commission Monday evening, and after some discussion, passed on first read ing. Passage after another reading is required to put the ordi-nance into effect.

Besides restricting the sale of

milk to be pasteurized and certiand the ordinance provides that all bottles used must be washed the first that bottling and eapping be done by automatic machinery, and that restaurants are to serve milk in the original bottles only \$500 per properties. to serve mink in the original solution only. Still other provisions are that pasteurizing plants have automatic coolers, thermometers, etc., that a milk inspector be appointed, and an annual license be obtained.

Commissioner Leo Gildemeister, who submitted the ordinance, said he was presenting it as part of the work assigned to him some time ago, of revising the eld ordinances and bringing them up to date. He stated that the present milk ordinance is out of date and not in line with modern regulations elsewhere.
