Officials Work On Fire Prevention Plan

send its heavy truck, equipped mainly for service where there is water, out into the country. With the sale of the City's smaller truck, it has become imperative that some other means of serving the Township be found.

The officials are agreed also that the Township can secure its best protection by making use of the City's trained department, several members of which are always available within a few moments after an alarm is received. City officials have offered the Township storage space at the fire hall without cost.

May Contract

The Township Board is prohibited by law from purchasing fire apparatus without a vote of the people, but may contract for fire protection service. It has been suggested that Farmington Township adopt a method used by other townships. The apparatus would be purchased in the name of the City, by the City Commission which has purchasing powers beyond those of the Township Board. The Township would make the payments for the truck to the City, under the contract for fire protection, and the City would in turn pay the truck company. The Township would pay the Farmington firemen the same rate they receive from the City.

The Township has paid the City hundreds of dollars for fire calls in the past year, it is pointed out, which might have gone toward the purchase of an engine. At the same time the proposition has not been very favorable for the City, because of heavy depreciation on country runs with the large truck.

Chemical Outfit

The apparatus which the Township officials are considering is a four-tank chemical outfit, each tank having a capacity of 40 gallons. The cost is approximately \$3,800, which would probably be spread over a period of three years.

The Township Board members are to go on a tour of inspection of localities with similar fire-protection problems Friday morning.

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
