

Offer To Assure Car Service Against Loss

if perhaps fifteen business-men of the section served by the system would agree to see that any loss in operation was made up, the main objection of the State Highway Department would be met, and this seemed to meet with general agreement.

Signatures Obtained
City Commissioner Carl Hogle then drew up a letter to be addressed to the State Highway Department, expressing the willingness of the signers to stand behind operation of the road and guarantee against any deficit. Copies of the letter were prepared Wednesday morning and a number of signatures obtained at the Farmington Exchange Club Wednesday noon. Other signatures were obtained Thursday. The letter will be taken to the State Highway Department within the next day or two.

Next Tuesday, December 16, is the date set for the termination of service, and those in charge are hastening their work in order to forestall, if possible, the State's ordering the rails torn up without further serious consideration.

The text of the letter to the State Highway Department, and the names of those who had signed it by Thursday afternoon, follow:

December 10, 1930.

Commissioner of State Highways Lansing, Mich.

Dear Sir:
The Detroit Street Railway Commission having agreed to continue the electric freight and passenger service to Farmington and intermediate points, providing they could do so without any operating loss, we the undersigned business men of Farmington and vicinity agree to make up

any deficit that they might incur through such operation.

It is our understanding that your department simply wants the assurance of continued operation of this line to induce you to retain the car-tracks on Grand River avenue according to original agreement.
