DEER HUNTERS EXCEED ALL PREVIOUS YEARS

While it will be several months before the Conservation Department will be able to know the final tally on the number of deer hunters who took out licenses this year, everything points to an un-

usually large number.

H. E. Green, Chief Conservation officer, says that he has never seen so many hunters in the field as there were this year. He estimated the kill to exceed that of last year, during the early part of the season.

Hunting law violations were about average, Green said. Considerable numbers of hunters were encountered who had evidently staked the cost of the trip against the value of several hundred pounds of venison.

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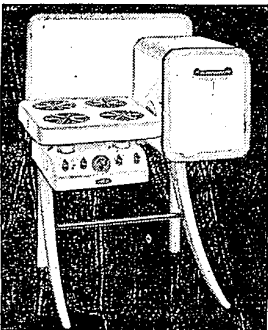
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
