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

TRITONS WIN

The Farmington basketballers defeated St. Mary's (Redford) 18-11 in a game held Friday.

St. Mary's opened up strong by dropping two shots. This lead, however, was soon cut by a basket by Lapham who later also dropped a foul. The score at the end of the first quarter was 4-3 in favor of St. Mary's.

The Tritons soon made a hole in St. Mary's defense, Lapham and Cairns each registering a field goal and a foul, St. Mary's being able to drop one from under the basket. The score at the half, 9-6 in favor of the Tritons.

The third quarter was very even, each team making two goals and Lapham the foot shot, making the score 14-11.

Cairns, who was held scoreless the previous quarters, came through, dropping a rebound shot and a long one being the only score made that period. The defense of the Tritons was very good this period holding St. Mary's scoreless.

Cairns was high point man with three field goals and a foul followed closely by Lapham who had two field goals and two foul shots.
