(The following letter appeared in the Daily Tribune, Royal Oak, Mich. It is a brief but discriminating presentation of land value taxation, the only tax reform that really goes to the root of our present tax troubles. Read it care fully and you will be convinced.

—H. Gibson.)

LAND VALUE TAXATION To the Editor:

Mr. A. La Moore in his seven steps for lower taxation suggests that 1, the Covert road law be rethat 1, the Covert road law be replaced 2, the drain laws be amend ed; 3, the State assume certain unpaid assessments of Covert road bonds; 4, the form of county-township organization be changed as an economy measure; 5, primary money be raised indistributed. rectly; 6, local expenses be cut, and 7, the State laws be amended and 7, the State laws be amended to facilitate appeal from high valuations. These seven changes: may be summed up under the following heads, 1. Economy, both in 'circulating certain projects and in cutting routine expense; 2, Substitution of indirect taxation for a part of the property tax; 3, Shifting taxes, or adjusting valuations, which amounts to the same thing, so that the burden is spread over a wider area. He also states that inflated land values; i. e., speculation in real estate, is i. e., speculation in real estate, is the chief cause of our tax-trouble. Now the lowering of the direct

taxes through economy, or by the substitution of indirect taxation will give an increased impetus to will give an increased impetus to land speculation because of the resulting lower cost of holding the property. Similarly, the shift-ing of taxes by revaluation will increase land speculation because the substitution of cash values for speculative values in assess-ing property will mean lower val-uations and lower taxes for prop-sert held for speculative purposerty held for speculative purposes and, necessarily, a higher tax es and, necessarily, a higher tax on property not now assessed at speculative values. Thus, we per-ceive that these suggested tax re-forms, while praiseworthy enough for other reasons, are not suffi-cient to prevent infiated land val-ues; in fact, they would increase such values somewhat.

such values somewhat.

The only real tax reform which discourages land speculation and at the same time encourages building construction is the substitution of a direct tax on land valuation alone for the present tax on the combined value of the land and the improvement thereon. This tax reform makes idle vecent prompty carry, its full on. This tax reform makes idle vacant property carry its full share of public expense and reduces the burden on the home owner or owner of other improved property. The lower taxes on improved property in this district. At the same time the holders of vacant land would feel more inclined to build, because their taxes would be no greater after they had built, except the increment due to gradually increasing land values as the district developed. This method of tax reform has

This method of tax reform has This method of tax reform has been known for many years and it is indorsed by many proninent economic authorities. However, I have no hope that any such change will be made; for, as we all know, real changes in governmental policy never occur as long as the old system can be patched up and enabled to limp along.
