CHILDREN IN HOSPITAL KEEP UP SCHOOL WORK

Ann Arbor—Continuing the development of the minds of child patients while medical treatment is re-building ill or injured physical bodies, so that the child returns to take his normal place in his home school, is the work of the Hospital School maintained by the Social Service Department of the University of Michigan Hospital. The School is a pioneer in this form of education and the largest of its kind, enrolling approximately 1,600 students during the year 1929-1930.
