**NOVI FIRE DEPT.
COMMENDED FOR
PROMPT SERVICE**

\$25 Reward Paid By Insurance Company For Saving Home Recently

A letter sent in care of H. G. Roach of Walled Lake to Walter Tuck of Novi from the Pioneer Reserve Mutual Fire Insurance Company praises the Novi Fire Department for the prompt and effective work done in saving the home of Frank Wosmik on the 11-Mile road recently. They enclose also a check for \$25 as a reward for the fire department's services.

The insurance company estimates that \$2,000 was saved by the prompt service of the department under the direction of Walter Tuck, fire chief. The fire had made great headway when the department arrived, but they managed to confine the damage mostly to the roof. H. G. Roach is the agent in this district for the Pioneer company.

The letter in part reads: "You certainly have a wide awake department and a splendid truck and I am confident that it will pay for itself in one year."

Novi recently purchased new apparatus, and has made a fine record for quick and effective service since then.

POLITICAL ANNOUNCEMENT

To my Friends and Fellow Voters of Farmington Township: In asking for a vote of confidence from the citizens of this township for another year, I would like to give them a brief resume of the work which has been done in the office of Highway Commissioner during the past year.

While carrying out a program of rigid economy, we were enabled, by taking advantage of the widening of Grand River avenue to secure much of that surplus dirt for fills. This dirt, hauled for us, with no cost to the Township, allowed us to put through Parker avenue on Krave subdivision, a job estimated at \$800, for about \$40. It also enabled us to widen Tuck road, and Rockwell avenue north of Grand River.

We have saved by following the construction of Grand River and intercepting the contractors, 90 feet of 24 inch corrugated culverts, and 60 feet of 18-inch corrugated pipe, which would otherwise have been destroyed, but which would have cost us, if purchased, approximately \$300.

We have spread up to date 1788 yards of gravel at \$1.60 per yard throughout the Township.

The amount of money appropriated for each district, the amount which we have spent, and the balance left to carry us until April, is as follows:

The following is a statement of my position regarding the conduct of the office of Supervisor:

- I believe that the supervisor, who must estimate values, assess taxes and represent the Township on the County Board of Supervisors should be a taxpayer.
- I believe that the salaries of all the Township officers, including that of Supervisor should be cut 25%. At present the Supervisor draws \$4,500, the Clerk \$1,600, Treasurer \$1,700 and Highway Commissioner 80 cents per hour.
- I realize the value of fire protection in the more congested parts of the Township but I am opposed to the purchase of any piece of fire equipment costing more than one thousand dollars unless it be sanctioned by a vote of the people.
- I am for an early settlement of the Town Hall question in a manner which will be fair and just to the three parties involved.
- In view of the great deficit now facing the Township in moneys owing to the school districts, I feel that the strictest economy is going to be necessary if these obligations are to be paid without an enormous increase in the tax rate.
- I condemn the methods, by which the Nine-Mile Road, costing the people of the Township ninety-eight thousands of dollars for two miles of road, was put upon the shoulders of the already overburdened taxpayer and I pledge myself if nominated and elected to prevent, if possible, Covert roads in this Township.
- Great dissatisfaction exists among many of the people over the way in which the Welfare Fund is being administered, should I be elected supervisor I should endeavor to investigate every case thoroughly and prevent money which should be used only for the support of worthy families, being wasted on those who are undeserving of aid.

If these policies meet with your approval, I will appreciate your support at the Primaries on March 2nd.
