**City Election Vote  
Almost Breaks Record**

Continued from page one) seven ballots of the number cast at the first City election, when 431 voters went to the polls.

At one time within the last hour before the polls closed, there was a lineup of voters extending to the door of the Town Hall waiting to cast their ballots. City Clerk N. H. Power brought forth an extra package of ballots during the last hour to care for the stream of voters.

**Campaigning Done**  
Interest in the capital punishment bill, heightened by the debate of last week, and a good deal of quiet but none-the-less vigorous personal campaigning by several candidates brought out the surprisingly large vote. The officials elected will take office next Monday.

With Mayor Arthur Lamb re-elected over Amos Otis, the latter running on a "sticker," by a vote of 291 to 112, chief interest turned to the battle for places on the City Commission. Two new commissioners were elected, Delos Hamlin leading the field with 243 votes and Howard Osmus being second with 226. Commissioner Fred Stammann was only 9 votes behind Mr. Osmus with 217 and Commissioner Carl Hogle was a close fourth with 205. The other two candidates, Bernard Banfield and Charles Ely, polled 156 and 73 votes respectively.

Commissioner-elect Hamlin is the youngest man ever elected to that office by the City, being 26 years old. Commissioner-elect Osmus, who ran second to Mr. Hamlin, is six years older, and is also one of the youngest Commissioners ever elected in the City. Commissioner Carl Goers is 32.

**Judge Race Close**  
The closest contest of the day occurred between Judge John J. Schulte and John H. Thayer for justice of the peace, with the latter winning 213 to 194. Hinman G. Nichols, former treasurer, won another term in that office by a comfortable margin, defeating Mrs. Bertha Westfall, 251 to 163. James L. Hogle easily won re-election as assessor over W. Allen Nelson, 324 to 77. Joseph A. Karle was re-elected to the board of review with 304 votes, while Harrison Johnson polled 330 for the other place on the board.

**Re-elected Constable**  
Marl Pettibone was re-elected constable with 251 votes and Thomas Armstrong won the other constable place with 234 votes. Fred Schaeperer polled 132 votes. City Clerk N. H. Power, unopposed for re-election received 367 votes.

The City Commission meets on Thursday evening to canvass the election and certify the results.

**Favor Amendments**  
Of the State and County votes cast, 277 were straight Republican, 45 straight Democrats, two Prohibitions and one Socialist. The City favored all four State amendments, although by close margins. The capital punishment vote was 181 to 167; on aiding landing fields, 153 to 150; on refunding state bonds, 164 to 151; and on state convention delegates 144 to 105.

Questionnaires have been sent home to find out how many parents are willing to help make the costumes and pay for their own. If the P. T. A. finds there will not be enough parents to co-operate, the pageant will be abandoned.

People having children in school are urged to boost the work the P. T. A. is doing.
