Police Prepare For Registration Of Auto Drivers

Blanks Now Available At Both City And Deputies' Police Booths

Plans for the registration of all automobile drivers in the City of Farmington and Farmington Township were arranged this week by Chief of Police Lee Doyle and Deputies Joseph De-Vriendt and William Tamm. Registration blanks are now available at the police booths in the City and the profession dumined the profession of the City and the profession of the City and the American Company of the Police booth in the City and the Police booth will be taken care of by Deputies DeVriendt and Tamm.

Each person destring one of the new driver's licenses must apply in person at the above named places and present a money order or certified check made payable to the Secretary of State. The fee is \$1.00. The cost of a chauffeur's license is \$2.00. Applicants are also expected to pay postage for forwarding blanks to Lansing.

Must Sign At Booth

The entire transaction must take place in the police booth, the blanks not being allowed to be removed. Arrangements have been made to have the blanks notarized and sent directly to Lansing.

All operators' licenses issued before January 1, 1925 must be renewed before Octoberr 31, 1931. Those registered between 1925 and 1928 have until May 1, 1932 to register, while those licensed after 1928 have 18 months in which to get a license, product of the control of the con
