The total cost of camp is \$5.00 for the five days, beginning Sunday afternoon, June 21 and running through until Friday morning.

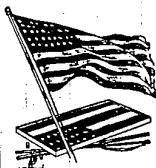
GRADE CHILDREN TO GIVE PROGRAM JUNE 4

With heads bowed, we recall tales of courage and sacrifice, accounts of battles won and lost by a nation that has ever upheld humanity's highest ideals.

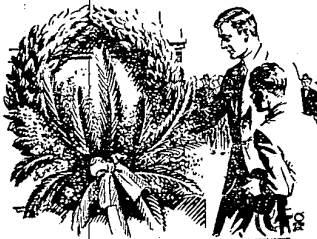
