## PHOTO SOLICITING SCHEME UNFOLDED BY BUREAU

House to house solicitors are visiting homes offering free enlargements of photographs.

The coupon used by one company:

"This certificate entitles to one portrait 10 x 16 inches in size absolutely free, for the purpose of extending and advertising our business. The only condition is that you purchase the frame for this portrait from us."

The condition is printed in ordinary type and is often overlooked by the customer.

There are many variations of the photo enlargement scheme. The purpose of all of them is to sell frames. The enlargement may be technically free, but complaints in the files of this Bureau prove that it is hard to get back even the original photograph unless one buys a frame.

Do not sign any memorandum for a photograph enlargement until you have read it carefully and understand it. The signed agreement fixes your obligation and not the talk of the agent. Better Business Bureau of Detroit, Inc.
