City Asks State To Replace Sidewalks

that once," referring to the Court Road paving.

Commissioner Hatton told Mr. Oakes that it was his understanding that the State was to replace sidewalks wherever it had destroyed walks. He pointed out that the City probably would have no place to put the walks now even if the City were ready to build them, due to the apparent mistake by engineers in laying out the route for the new pavement. He said, there should be seven and one-half feet left on each side of the pavement for walks, but there is no room on the south side, now.

Whole Road Misplaced

From the discussion, it appeared that the entire 50 foot pavement for about two blocks is apparently in the wrong place, about 9 feet south of where it should be.

Mr. Oakes urged the Commission to send a letter to the Department expressing their sentiments, but the Commissioners suggested that the State first make a survey of the situation.

Hearing Delayed

Hearing of the Tredway suit Monday in Pontiac was postponed for a week. It was reported that Thomas McGee had filed a similar suit, but this proved untrue. Mr. McGee has had his property surveyed, but has taken no further action, awaiting outcome of the Tredway case.

A greatly improved appearance will probably result east and west of School street on the north side of the street, as the incline has been cut down, so that the ground just inside the new walks can be terraced, with the walk at the curb level. Previously the walk has been from one to two feet above the curb, with a bare earth drop between.

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MAN LEAPS INTO PATH OF MACHINE, CALLED SUICIDE

Unidentified Man Believed To Be Suicide At 13 Mile Road, Telegraph Crossing

Throwing himself in front of a passing automobile at the intersection of Thirteen Mile and Telegraph roads at 7.30 p. m. Wednesday, an unidentified man was instantly killed. Driving the machine was William A. Guiger, 45 years old, of Flint.

Guiger, explained to Maurice Cole, assistant prosecutor of Oakland County that the man leaped in front of the car, with intention to commit suicide. Three cars passed before the man ran directly into the path of Guiger's machine. It was said:

The dead man was described as 40 years old, weighing 160 pounds, clad in working clothes, and high top-boots, and wearing a ring with the initial "F". Guiger was not held.
