Obviously, the President does not
figure in all of them. President
Hoover, however, does use the telephone more than any of this predcessors, and he is the first Chief
Executive to have a telephone installed on his desk. Previous Presidents, whenever they wanded to use

booth a few yards away from their
desk, but President Hoover found
this arrangement inconvenient, and
the booth has been supersided by a
desk telephone.
