

## TWO ARE DROWNED AT COMMERCE LAKE; ONE NEAR WIXOM

16-Year Old Girl Tries To Save Guest, Both Sink; Man Drowns After Eating

A 16-year old girl, who is reported to have tempted her 15-year old guest to enter deep water in Commerce Lake at Oakley Park Sunday was drowned in attempting to save the younger girl who could not swim. The friend, who had been visiting her friend at the lake, also was drowned. A man, who sank in Proud Lake northeast of Wixom, after having eaten a hearty meal, and a bather who died of a broken neck, brought the total of deaths at Oakland County lakes to 19.

The dead are:  
Teresa Petrucci, 16 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Petrucci, 4810 Nottingham road, Detroit.

Dora Tubaro, 15 years old, Roy-alton, Ohio, who was visiting the Petruccis.

John M. Renik, 38 years old, 2993 Lyman place, Detroit.

Theresa and Dora were wading together during a picnic on the shores of Commerce Lake when the tragedy occurred. Theresa, who was able to swim, entered deep water, and deputies report, beckoned Dora to follow her.

Dora attempted to swim at Theresa's side, but apparently was unable to stay above the water. Theresa tried to save the girl, and both sank.

The bodies were recovered about a half hour apart when deputies dragged the lake.

Over 2,000 persons crowded about the beach to witness the search for the girls. Several aided in the search for the bodies, the crowd remaining orderly.

**Sinks Near Shore**  
Renik, who according to Coroner Voorhees, Undersheriff Greenan, and Deputy John McIlroy, went swimming after he had eaten a heavy meal, sank between shore and the diving dock in deep water at Proud Lake.

He is survived by his widow Mary, and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Renik, of Detroit. Proud Lake is located two miles north and a half mile east of Wixom.

## TELEPHONE LINES UNHURT AS STORM DOWNS POLES

When a freak snow storm descended upon central New York this past winter, several telephone poles were blown down as a line west of Syracuse, but not a single break in the service occurred. Upon investigation by telephone plant men, it was found that west of Farmington six poles were lying across the road, five poles were leaning at different angles, but not a crossarm, a wire, nor an insulator had been broken, and the lines leading to the west were all in good working order.

## TELEPHONE LINES AT WHITE HOUSE

### ARE BUSY

An Average of a Thousand Calls  
a Day Is Made and Received  
at the Executive Mansion

In view of the recently published statement that the telephone in the White House are now being used to a greater extent than ever before, and that during 1930 over 385,000 telephone calls were made and received through the White House private branch telephone switchboard, the question arises as to who makes and receives all these calls.

## First to Have Desk Telephone

Obviously, the President does not figure in all of them. President Hoover, however, does use the telephone more than any of his predecessors, and he is the first Chief Executive to have a telephone installed on his desk. Previous Presidents, whenever they wanted to use the telephone, went to a telephone booth a few yards away from their desk, but President Hoover found this arrangement inconvenient, and the booth has been superseded by a desk telephone.

## Official Appointments Are Made

The great majority of the White House calls relate to official business. Cabinet officers talk freely with the President over the wire, subordinate officials less frequently; but there are many times when the heads of bureaus, assistant secretaries, and other officials find it necessary to talk at least with one of the President's secretaries. Cabinet meetings are held at specified dates each week, but when a Cabinet officer wishes to see his Chief on other days, the appointment is made, as a rule, by telephone. When Congress is in session, many matters come up which require a White House call, and most of these appointments are made by telephone.

## White House Has 102 Lines

Newspaper men also use the White House telephones frequently. The press room at the White House has its own telephone number, but the correspondents find it necessary from time to time to speak with one of the secretaries or other members of the White House staff.
