Had Many Interests

Mr. Warner was interested in many activities in which he displayed unusual ability as an executive. He managed the estate of his father, and was a director of the First National Bank and Trust Company of Pontiac, Birmingham Savings Bank, Farmington State Savings Bank, and Oakland County Savings and Loan Association. He was vice-president of the Warner Dairy Co., secretary-treasurer of the Farmington Improvement Co., and president of the Wolverine Storage Co. of Detroit.

He served the community as a member of the Board of Education from 1925 to 1927.

Mr. Warner was a member of Groves-Walker Post, American Legion of Farmington, Farmington Masonic Lodge, was a thirty-second degree Mason, and a member of the Mystic Shrine. Other club affiliations included Meadowbrook Country Club, Pine Lake Country Club, and Detroit Hunt and Fish Club.

1931 PRODUCTION EXCEEDS RECORD MADE LAST YEAR

Chevrolet Shows Increase In Output For Month Of August This Year

Production of Chevrolet cars and trucks in August totaled 54,958 units as compared with 51,622 in the same month of 1930. W. S. Knudsen, president and General Manager, announced today.

August is the fourth successive month this year to show a gain over the corresponding month of 1930, and the output for August brings the total for the first eight months of 1931 to 643,410 cars and trucks.

Of the volume during the month just ended, 50,885 were built for the domestic market as against 47,264 a year ago. The domestic production for July also exceeded the volume for July of last year. Mr. Knudsen stated that this sustained improvement in buying over 1930 indicates an increase in United States retail buying power.

Production will continue through September. The current employment figure shows approximately 33,000 men on the Chevrolet payroll.
