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LAW PASSED BY LAST LEGISLATURE BECOME EFFECTIVE

Eastern Standard Time Becomes Official All Over Michigan This Friday

Lansing, Mich.—Of the 339 laws passed by the 1931 legislature and signed by the governor, 225 will become effective September 18. The others took effect upon approval by the governor. The state constitution provides that all laws not given immediate effect by a two-thirds vote of both house of representatives and senate, shall become effective after the final adjournment of the legislature.

The act which will have the greatest effect on a majority of Michigan citizens is that making Eastern time official in all parts of the state. After September 18, railroads, courts and other public agencies in all parts of Michigan will operate on Eastern Time.

One law will not become effective as its operation, has been delayed by the filing with the Department of State of the requisite number of signatures on petitions calling for a referendum in November, 1932. This is the act prohibiting the sale or serving in public places of colored oleomargarine.

RECALLS DR. BELL AS GREAT HUMANITARIAN

Thomas Watson, Who Made First Telephone, Praises Inventor

Dr. Thomas A. Watson, builder of the first telephone, aside to Alexander Graham Bell, recently had the following to say in regard to the great inventor:

"I have often been asked what, kind of a man Bell seemed to me, in those days when I was working with him. I know him as modest, kind-hearted, thoughtful for others and a gentleman in every sense of the word. Bell was a man as rare as radium and with a mind as penetrative."

"He was eminently a scientist in his earnest, honest, openminded endeavor to add to man's knowledge of great Nature's secrets. But he was more than a scientist. I can write him down as pre-eminently one who loved his fellow man."

"His work on the telephone was carried on side by side with his splendid, unique labors for the deaf. It seemed to me, when I was associated with him, that his interest in both these great subjects had the same fundamental basis—his desire to help others. Entirely unambitious for wealth or for fame, his telephone was to him something to help the world, and his work for the deaf was enthusiastically because he realized what great happiness he was bringing into the lives of those who have that terrible handicap of total deafness."

GREEN TERMINAL BOXES APPEAL TO WOODPECKERS

Telephone equipment is occasionally put out of commission by woodpeckers. However, telephone engineers have discovered that if the terminal boxes on poles are painted white, they are left alone until the white paint grows dull or wears off, but that terminal boxes painted green have a certain something that tempts a woodpecker to start right to work with the same eagerness and enthusiasm that the average man has when he tackles a piece of pumpkin pie. The appetizing green color of the terminal box, together with the hollow sound, prove irresistible to woodpeckers out on a worm hunt, and while they find no worms, they do "sometimes" succeed in short-circuiting the lines.

TELEPHONE SYSTEM GROWS IN IRISH FREE STATE

Since the telephone service in the Irish Free State was taken over from England, much progress has been made, out-of-town plant has been replaced; and extensions to rural areas are now being pushed as fast as practicable.

The number of exchanges has grown from 14 in 1922 to 720 in 1931, and the number of call offices from 552 to 1,257. The telephone growth has mounted from 19,101 in 1922 to 30,465 in 1931. One of the major propositions has been the converting of the central area of Dublin from manual to dial operation. In Limerick a new manual exchange has been installed, and it is hoped soon to convert the Bathinist and Terenure exchanges to the dial system.


