## MURPHYS LEAD KELLYS IN N. Y. TELEPHONE DIRECTORY

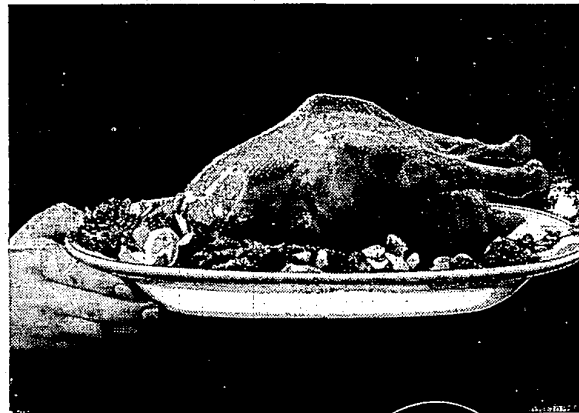
In the New York City Telephone directory there are many names of Irish lineage among the listings. The Murphys lead having some 1,920 listings. Next come the Kellys with about 1,700, followed by the Sullivans with 1,450. Not only do the Murphys lead in New York, but they also lead in Ireland, although the Murphys having telephones in New York are ten times as numerous as those who appear in Erin's telephone books. The telephone in Ireland hasn't reached the high development that it has in New York, al-

though in recent years the gains have been marked. A compilation of the various telephone directories in Ireland shows that the Murphys lead with 210 listings, and that the Kellys are second with 114. The Sullivans, however, do not show up as well as in New York, for the Ryans occupy third place in Ireland with 118 listings.

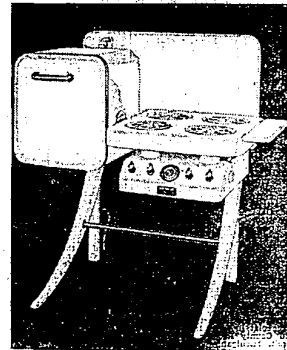
