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OAKLAND COUNTY SHOWS LOSS FOR 95 YEAR PERIOD

Listed With 36 Other Counties Paying Surplus In Relation To Receipts

Oakland County is one of 36 counties that has paid in state taxes since 1837 in excess of the amounts returned from the primary school fund, according to figures released by O. B. Fuller, auditor general.

Oakland's excess amounts to \$6,810,771. Wayne county leads in paying the greater part with an excess of \$72,693,077.

In the 95 years since Michigan became a state, including the present year, the State property tax has totaled \$427,000,697, or approximately \$4,600,000 a year. The primary school fund distributions have amounted to \$311,437,961 or about \$3,278,000 a year. The differences between the two totals is \$115,562,736.

Forty nine counties have shown a profit.

Ten Community Projects Planned By Exchangeites

Warner offered a site which he said he believed would be a good one for a skating rink.

Third, Rev. Johnson declared that a recreation place is needed for young people. He described as "tragic" the circumstances of young men and women having no highly desirable place in which to spend their time after school and following graduation.

The Log Cabin in Town Hall Park should be given some care immediately, to improve its appearance and preserve it. The bark might be stripped off and oiled, and after the cabin was put in shape, it might be used as a museum for old things used by former generations.

The former D. U. R. powerhouse at Farmington Junction, Rev. Johnson pointed out as another vacant structure which might be used to foster a local industry, such as, perhaps, basket making. Also along this line was another suggestion, that a committee be designated to seek and stimulate employment for those in this section out of work.

Encouragement of tree-planting locally was suggested by Rev. Johnson, referring to similar work being carried on elsewhere in the State. Howard Warner offered to give 75 elms for replanting. The elms are just about the right size for transplanting, and would be available without charge Mr. Warner said.

Another project on Rev. Johnson's list is a more adequate space for the library, including a reading room and increased library facilities.

Rev. Johnson's suggestions were met favorably by the club members, and a committee will be appointed on each of the projects suggested. Nathan H. Power, vice-president, who presided, drew up a tentative list of committees, deferring appointments until after conference with president Z. R. Aschen-Brenner.

PUBLISH CATALOGUE OF MICHIGAN WILD LIFE

Lansing, Oct. 26—A catalogue of wild life and natural resource motion pictures and an outline of the system through which they are loaned to the public has been published by the Educational Division of the Department of Conservation.

The catalogue lists 15 reels of motion pictures which are available for loan to various schools, churches, and other organizations and which may be obtained for the cost of transportation.

FORESTRY STUDENTS BUILD FIREBREAKS AT "RINGWOOD"

Ann Arbor, Oct. 26—Three miles of firebreak, ten to sixteen feet wide, have just been completed by student foresters from the University of Michigan at "Ringwood," a forest property on Bad River near St. Charles.

The firebreak was cut through stands of second growth hardwoods which came in following an old forest fire. The ground was then thoroughly cleared and plowed. The strip will be maintained from now on as a protection to this interesting tract presented to the University last year by Clark H. Ring of Saginaw.
