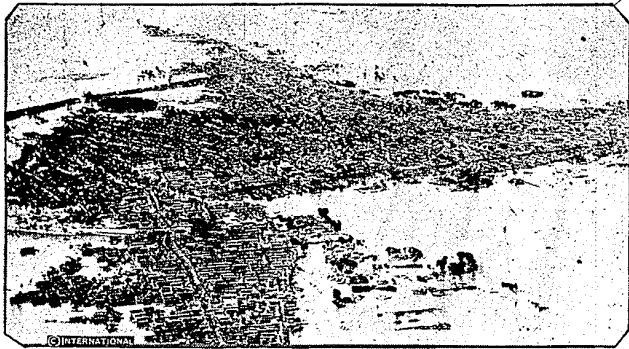
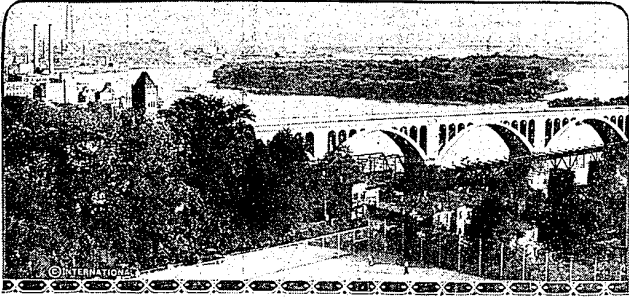


Lindbergh Photo of Flooded Chinese City

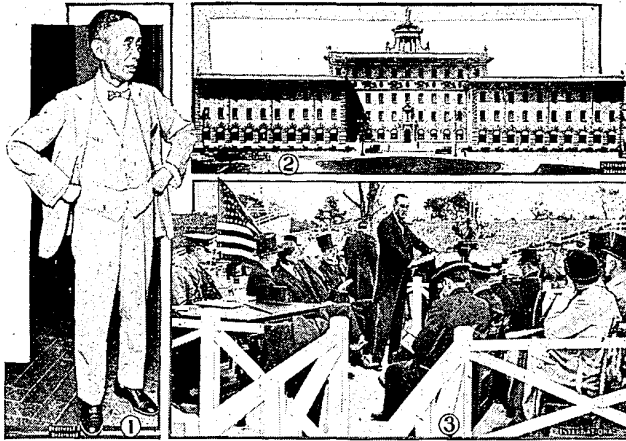
