**THREE RECEIVE SILVER MEDALS AS VAIL AWARDS**

Recognition Given 41 Telephone Men and Women for Noteworthy Acts of Service in 1930

Vail Medals in bronze have been awarded to 38 Bell System employees in all parts of the country for noteworthy services performed during the year 1930. In addition, three national awards of Vail Medals in silver have been made, each accompanied by a cash award.

Perpetuating Vail's Service Ideals Vail Medals are awarded annually as a memorial to Theodore N. Vail, for many years President of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, for acts which conspicuously illustrate Mr. Vail's ideals of public service. In this way recognition is given a few of the most conspicuous examples of noteworthy services that are daily occurrences among telephone employees.

The three 1930 national awards of silver medals are made to: Miss Hazel H. Haase, Chief Operator at Clinton, Ind., for the Indiana Bell Telephone Company; Leonard J. Strang, window washer at Cleveland, O., for the Ohio Bell Telephone Company; and Irena F. Vannoy, restaurant at Winchester, Va., for the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company of Virginia.

Operator Directs Bandits' Pursuit Miss Haase, learning on the morning of December 15, 1930, that five bandits had held up and robbed the Citizens Bank at Clinton, Ind., notified the county sheriff, and the police departments and other civil authorities of all the towns located in the general direction taken by the bandits, who were fleeing in an automobile. Due to her intelligent use of the telephone, her initiative and resourcefulness, and the descriptions she gave to the citizens of the countryside, the bandits were unable to break through the spreading circle of intelligence which she kept ahead of their flight, relaying the information from town to town and from farm to farm. They were overtaken after a pursuit of more than fifty miles, two were captured, three were killed, and the loot was recovered.

Rescues Fellow Worker From Death The award to Mr. Strang was for extraordinary courage, resourcefulness and initiative in saving the life of a fellow employee on October 14, 1930. He and Edward S. Debro were cleaning windows on the fifth floor of an uncompleted portion of a building, when Debro's safety belt became detached from one of the window rings, leaving him dangling helplessly at the end of one strap. Although Strang found the ring supporting Debro had become dangerously weakened, and realized the great strain that would be placed upon his own belt by the added weight of the struggling man, he fastened one of the straps of his belt to the adjacent window and the other to the weakened ring from which Debro was hanging, and pulled him to safety. Saves Switchboard, Restores Service Late on the night of August 4, 1930, Mr. Vannoy saved the telephone office equipment in the town of Gore, Va., from fire and restored the telephone service of the community. Vannoy had traveled twelve miles from Winchester when notified that fire threatened to destroy the town, and after relieving the operator and summoning additional help, with the aid of several men he moved the switchboard and other equipment to an open field where he improvised a telephone station, and within twenty minutes established service with Winchester.

## Mother's Cook Book

**CHILDREN'S DISHES**

THOSE who have had the most success in teaching children to like all kinds of foods, or at least tolerate them, have found that where the grown-ups will eat and express pleasure over food, the youngsters will follow, especially by boys. If daddy appears to enjoy certain foods, son will strive to do so, too.

A mother has such a world of things to do to keep the home comfortable, care for the babies, feed the family and as soon as the children begin to go to school help them puzzle over their school problems. She certainly needs co-operation and help from the head of the house with the child who does not like the foods that are good for and necessary for him. Think of planning three meals a day and trying to make them palatable with variety and on a small budget for food. There would not be many business houses that would hold up under such a strain.

During the summer when the children are out of doors, and do not have to depend on school lunches, they are easy to feed, but with the fall and winter comes the lunch problem for thousands of children who must carry a school lunch.

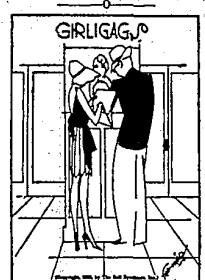
Children crave sweets; it seems they need sugar to supply the energy that is so freely used in their natural activities. The sweets of dried fruits such as grapes, dates and figs are always good. Pure candy, a piece or two after meals or between meals (not too near the meal) are especially good for children.

Simple puddings like cooked custard, cornstarch pudding flavored with cocoa, caramel or maple, are all enjoyed by the little people. Plenty of fresh vegetables, when seasonable and cut small when the fresh are out of the market, are essential for good health.

Rice and Carrot Soup.

Take one cupful of washed carrots, a few grains of nutmeg, one cupful carrot stock (the water in which they were cooked), two tablespoonsful of flour mixed with one tablespoonful of butter, salt, pepper and a half cupful of cooked rice with three cupfuls of milk. Combine the carrots with the water and milk, add the butter and flour which have been cooked together, and then smooth add the rice and seasonings, finishing with a tablespoonful and a half of minced parsley on top of the soup. Serve hot. Any leftover soup will keep in the ice chest for another day.

England's Oldest Clock The very oldest clock in England is believed to be that of Peterborough cathedral, which was erected 611 years ago. This has no dial. It has to be wound up daily by means of a great wooden wheel, which raises a three-hundredweight leaden weight 500 feet. The "gong" on which it strikes the hours is the thirty-two hundredweight tensor bell of the cathedral, which is smitten, every hour by an 85-pound hammer.

## Your Telephone comes from



Before the Shepherd Kings ruled in ancient Egypt, the raising of sheep for their wool was one of man's well established industries. Among the most famous of sheep is the merino, a breed produced by the Moors of Spain by crossing the hardy African sheep with the more delicate but high-grade Roman strain. During the reign of George III of England a few merinos were introduced into Australia, where they thrived and rapidly increased in numbers. Today sheep herding is one of Australia's principal industries.

One of the most important uses of wool is in the manufacture of felt. This material, in turn, is used in the manufacture of hats, clothing, floor coverings, planes and for many other purposes. The pad on the base of the telephone instrument is made from a special grade of woven felt. Although it plays no direct part in the transmission of the voice, this felt contributes importantly to the comfort, convenience and economy of telephone service.
