principal speaker of the evening, substituting for Prof. Gardner, who was unable to be present. Prof. Cardinell spoke on "The Past, Present and Future" of fruit-growing industry, and its problems.

Condemns "Facing"

Why apples from the Northwest have taken away a large share of the market from Michigan apples, and will continue to do so unless prompt and positive action is taken, was dwelt on at length by Prof. Cardinell. He declared that the old practice of "facing" crates of apples, i. e., putting the largest and best ones on top, has cost Michigan growers dearly. Lack of uniformity in grading has been another evil which has caused the public to prefer western apples, which are graded strictly, and are alike in size throughout the basket. Prof. Cardinell asserted that the buying public has become aware of the "tricks" in packing apples and is no longer fooled. Thus second grade western apples compete on the market every day now with first grade Michigan apples, he stated.

Another factor, the speaker pointed out, is the drop in per capita consumption of apples in this country from the figure of 110 pounds 30 years ago, to 78 pounds about ten years ago, when figures were last available. Meanwhile citrus fruits, grape-fruits and oranges and the like, have jumped from nine to 78 pounds per capita consumption.

"Can Regain Market"

Despite these factors, southeastern Michigan growers have advantages in the superior and quicker marketability of their apples, to re-capture the markets they have lost and build up again the demand for apples, if they will correct their mistakes and co-operate in their efforts, Prof. Cardinell said.

The tables at the banquet were attractively decorated in autumn effect, with several varieties of chrysanthemums. Decorations were the work of J. VanVolkenburg of Farmington Greenhouses, who donated the flowers and greens. Dinner was served by the M. E. Ladies Aid Society.

Arrangements for the event were in charge of a committee consisting of President Aschen-Brenner, Emory Hutton, Edward Baker, Floyd Johnson, and Elmer Palmer. Members of the committee held at scores of farms personally last week end, extending invitations and distributing tickets for the dinner.

HORTON TRESPASS LAW APPLIES TO ROADS ALSO

Lansing, Nov. 11—The Horton Tresspass law applies to a roadway just as it does to adjoining lands and hunting on the roadway constitutes trespass unless permission has been given by the adjoining property owner.

This is the answer being given by the Department of Conservation to numerous inquiries relative to this question. The opinion said that "no person has a right to shoot from the highway any more than he has a right to go on the land, as the only rights the public have is an easement to pass over."
