John Rostin, second string player, suffered a dislocation of the left shoulder in making the first tackle of the game.

The Reserves were quite proud of defeating New Hudson practically by themselves, having previously lost to the same team in a practice game earlier in the season. The Reserves made two of the five touchdowns.

New Hudson was crippled by the loss of two outstanding back players. They showed real sportsmanship and fought hard for every yard. They made some spectacular end runs but lacked the necessary punch to carry on over the goal line.

Walled Lake is scheduled to play Plymouth this Friday. Both teams have nearly spotless records, Plymouth having lost only one game, that to Dearborn, while Walled Lake has a clean record for the season.

NEW STRUCTURE TOWERS QUARTER OF MILE IN AIR

Empire State, World's Tallest Building, Has Telephone Plant to Serve 25,000

Empire State, the office building and tallest man-made structure in the world, now towers a quarter of a mile—less seventy-two feet—above Fifth Avenue at 34th Street, New York, on the former site of the famous Waldorf-Astoria hotel. Completed in less than a year from the placing of the first steel column, erection of this greatest skyscraper of them all in the midst of a busy city required the closest coordination of supplies with the progress of construction. Material, accurately marked for position, was delivered as needed and hoisted to the desired location without delay, the operation of the seventeen interior material hoists being controlled at all times by a special temporary telephone system.

Apparatus Placed During Construction

Telephone will be a vital need of tenants occupying the 35 rentable floors of the building, and telephone engineers have worked closely with the architects and contractors of the building since its beginnings on paper, foreseeing these requirements and arranging during construction to have adequate telephone facilities available when the building was opened for occupancy.

A sub-basement cable room houses batteries and other apparatus, and here three 1300-pair telephone cables enter from the street. Rising from this room through separate shaftways, nine smaller cables branch up and out to bring telephone wires to the offices on all floors, and so high above the street are the top-floor offices that the vertical length of the wires from them to the basement cable room is about half the horizontal distance from the cable room to the New York Telephone Company's nearest central office on West 34th Street. None of this equipment will be the telephone user see, of course, and even the wires for individual telephones will be brought in under-door ducts directly to the desks on which the instruments will be placed.

Telephone Equipment for 25,000

With an expected daily population of 25,000, Empire State will contain a sizeable number of telephone equipment. Estimates based on experience with other large buildings indicate that some 6,000 telephones will be installed for subscribers, served over individual lines and nearly 600 private branch offices trunks. In addition, there will probably be 500 miscellaneous circuits for fire-alarms, leased wires, and teletypewriter operation.

The administration of the building also calls for a complete telephone installation of 200 instruments; there will be 10 public telephones in the lobby; and even the 62 high speed elevators have each its telephone for the use of the elevator operator.
