

**ILLUSTRATED TALK GIVEN MASONS BY WORLD TRAVELER**

**More Than 100 Masons Hear Royal Oak Pastor Tell Of Journeys**

More than 100 Masons, members of Farmington lodge No. 151, F. & A. M., and of Aecia lodge of Detroit, heard Rev. Walter F. Hetzel, pastor of the Evangelical church of Royal Oak, give an illustrated lecture of a trip through the Holy Land and Northern Africa. Rev. Hetzel used moving pictures, which he took himself during his travels, to point out many unusual things of interest.

**Exhibits Curious**  
Rev. Hetzel devoted most of his time to a discussion of Palestine, the cities of Jerusalem and Bethlehem and the stone quarries from where the stone for King Solomon's temple was quarried. Rev. Hetzel exhibited many curios he had picked up in the East. One that he showed was a fez and he explained why a Moslem always wears that manner of headgear which has no brim. A Moslem at prayer, must have his head covered and still at the same time touch the ground with his forehead which would be impossible with a brimmed hat. Rev. Hetzel described the pyramids of Egypt, the barren country around Jerusalem, and showed

pictures of Mt. Vesuvius in Italy and remains of cities destroyed centuries ago by this volcano. The speaker told of entering the great quarries where stone for King Solomon's temple was obtained and that marks can still be seen on the walls high above the present level where workmen of King Hiram heaved stone.

**Tells Of Albany**  
In connection with the stone quarries Rev. Hetzel told of General Allenby, commander of the British forces in the East during the World War, keeping his camels sheltered in the quarries. So great were General Allenby's camel herds, Rev. Hetzel said, that if they passed four abreast past a certain point, it would take the caravan from daybreak until sunset to pass. Rev. Hetzel also showed pictures of the ruins in Greece of the Acropolis, Parthenon, Coliseum and other great monuments to a fallen civilization. Rev. Hetzel was introduced at the dinner preceding his address by Rev. A. A. Schoen, pastor of the Farmington Evangelical church. Rev. Hetzel was urged to come to Farmington and give his lecture by Joseph Himmelspach, master of the Farmington lodge, to whom Rev. Hetzel presented a small stone which he picked up in a quarry in the Holy Land.

the right time and place. Motorists driving on the highways at night should use great care to be on their guard. If approaching a traffic signal, try to judge your speed so that by the time you get to the light you will have the green. Make a habit of this and you will generally avoid coming to a dead stop. Avoid lonely roads and less traveled highways, especially at night.

"Motorists to some extent have taken advantage of these conditions and gone to the other extreme to run through red lights. This, of course, is in violation of the State law and often results in serious accidents. Don't drive at such a speed approaching a traffic signal light that if it turns, you cannot stop. Slacken your speed and approach the light with your car under control. Running red lights encourages the disrespect for other laws.

"In parking your car, even for a short time, lock it securely. Keep the doors and windows in your homes and business places locked and examine them before retiring or leaving them.

"All holdups and any violation should be reported immediately to the police. If this is done, proper action for apprehending the criminals can be made. It is certain that the proper procedure cannot

be taken if violations are not promptly reported to the proper authorities.

"If the police are notified and a description is obtained of the men and the automobile, they are able to give information to the Radio division of the Detroit Police and also to the State police. Detroit and most of the surrounding cities and villages have radio police cruisers. There are also Sheriff's and State police cruisers on the highways during all hours. Upon receiving this information over the radio, the cruisers stand a fair chance of catching the culprits, providing a description of the men wanted is given the police.

"Citizens should co-operate with their police officers and report immediately any suspicious characters loitering or a parked car that may arouse suspicions, day or night.

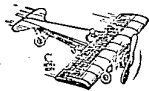
