STATE WILL ESTABLISH EXPERIMENTAL STATION

Lansing, Dec. 16—Establishment of an experimental trout feeding station on the Jumbo River near Kenton in Ontonagon County will be started next spring, it was announced today by the Fish Division of the Department of Conservation.

The station was made possible through the loan of land by M. J. Fox of Iron Mountain, a member of the Conservation Commission.

MAIL CARRIERS CANNOT USE FEDERAL LICENSES

Lansing, Dec. 16—Mail carriers and other postal employees who use their own or rented automobiles in their employment, must obtain Michigan license plates in the regular manner, the Department of State has been notified by the First Assistant Postmaster General.

Only automobiles owned by the federal postoffice department are entitled to use plates designated "U. S. Mail," it was stated. The federal ruling furnished the department asserts:

"The State cannot require the Federal government to procure plates for use on vehicles owned by the Government, but this does not apply to vehicles rented by the Government, either from a postal employe or an individual in connection with the postal service for use in mail transportation, as the owner of a motor vehicle for hire is required to furnish plates as a means of identification."

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kennedy and family motored to White Lake Sunday where they spent the day at the home of Mrs. Graham.

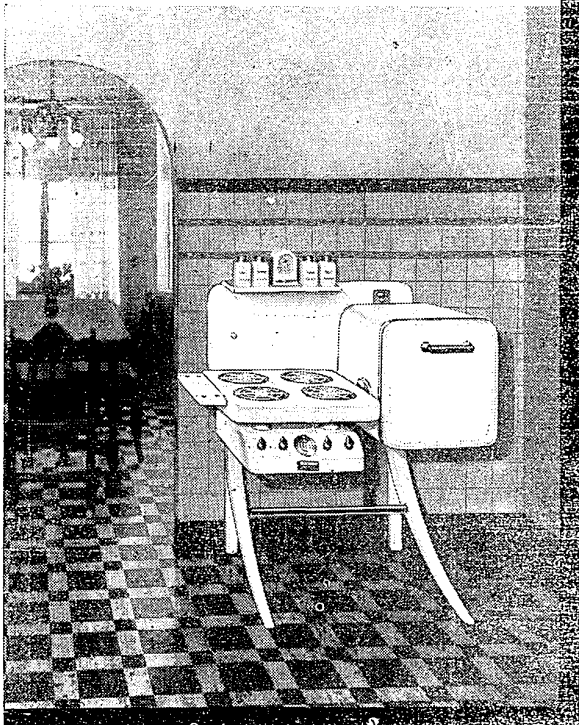
