### 1932 PROSPECTS FOR AUTOMOBILE SALES SEEM GOOD

W. F. Goers, Hudson-Essex Dealer, Returns From Preview Of 1932 Models

With an estimate of 321,800 automobiles which must be replaced with new cars in the very near future in the Detroit area in which Farmington is located, prospects for the 1932 sale of new automobiles in this territory are far brighter than at any time during the past few years.

This was the report brought back to Farmington by W. F. Goers, Hudson and Essex dealer, who returned today from Detroit where he attended a private preview of new 1932 Hudson and Essex models which, he said, establish a new record for the number of advanced features.

Because of light buying during the past two years, Mr. Goers said that the heads of Hudson selling organizations attending the meeting reported that thousands of replacements must be made in the very near future, and that as a result there are more prospective purchasers of new automobiles in this area than at any time since 1925 or 1926.

"Deficiency of sales during the past two years, plus normal expectancy, makes an unprecedented potential market for the sale of approximately 321,800 new automobiles in this territory in 1932," Mr. Goers said.
