## COLOR SCHEME OF 1932 PLATES WILL BE DECIDED SOON

Final Choice Lies Between Black-Yellow And Blue-White Combinations

Lansing, Mich. Jan. 19.—Final decision regarding the color combination of the 1932 motor vehicle license plates, is to be made soon by the Department of State. Two combinations are being considered at the present time.

The first calls for black numerals on yellow background. The second calls for blue numerals on a white background, a reverse of the colors of the 1932 plates. Within the next few weeks, a decision also will be made regarding the use of Michigan-mined copper in the next year's plates.

The black on yellow color combination is generally recognized as the most legible combination possible while the blue on white is considered to have third place in legibility of color combinations. Michigan and Ohio 1932 plates are very similar, both having white figures on a blue background. The most marked difference is in the location of the name of the state. Michigan plates have the words "Michigan 1932" above the numerals while Ohio puts the year and state below the numerals.

The 1932 color combinations of other nearby states are: Illinois, blue and orange; Indiana, green and white; Kentucky, maroon and white; Minnesota, maroon and gold; New York, black and yellow; Pennsylvania, gold and blue; West Virginia, black and white; and Wisconsin, yellow and blue. The Province of Ontario is using Lodge late. First degree was put a combination of grey and black on.
