### NEW HUDSON-ESSEX CARS HAVE COMPLETE SUSPENSION SYSTEM

Shock Absorber Action Under Complete Control Of Operator

Among the engineering features of the new Hudson and Essex cars announced at this year's show is a complete system which is the result of an extremely rigid investigation into the factors which make up easy riding. On the new Hudson and Essex cars the matter has been attacked from several angles including variable shock absorber action, properly designed leaf springs, and particularly upholstery springs from which the vertical or throwing action has been largely eliminated.

In adopting the so-called ride control; by means of which shock absorber action is under the control of the driver, the installation on the Hudson and Essex cars has been made unusually complete and a much wider range of action is provided. At the will of the driver a variation can be made all the way from practically no shock absorber action at all up to a very stiff action which will take care of the roughest roads at high speed.

With this new ride control it has been possible to use a more flexible leaf spring suspension. Instead of designing the springs for average conditions, on the Hudson and Essex cars they are designed to provide the best possible riding qualities on smooth roads. The driver himself can regulate the varying amount of shock absorber action necessary up to a stiffly damped spring action for rough roads. The driver is thus in a position, by means of the very accessible instrument board control, to have just the type of ride he wants.

To still further perfect the riding qualities of the car an entirely new idea in upholstery spring

suspension has been incorporated. On the Hudson and Essex cars there are now transverse or lateral springs which are mounted as a foundation for the vertical coil springs in the upholstery. The action of the horizontal coil springs being in a transverse direction does not throw the passengers from their seats. At the same time it is possible to use these lateral springs, vertical springs which are lighter. The combination of horizontal and vertical springs gives a differential action which eliminates the throw of the passengers in traveling over rough and uneven roads. The combination of all of these factors has produced a car which is claimed to have extraordinary riding qualities.

### DIGEST OF FISHING LAWS WILL REMAIN UNCHANGED

Lansing, Jan 27—Regulations governing open and closed inland lakes and streams as determined by the Conservation Commission, will remain unchanged for two years.

This action was taken by the Commission on recommendation of the Fish Division as a public convenience and a measure of economy in eliminating the issuance of a new digest of fishing laws of the 1933 season.

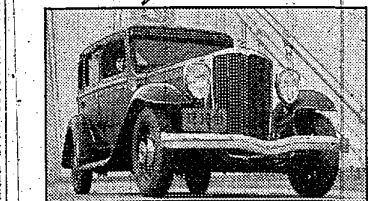
