PIONEER OF WALLED LAKE CELEBRATES 76th ANNIVERSARY

Miss Lute E. Hoyt Oldest Native, Born Resident of Walled Lake

Miss Lute E. Hoyt, Walled Lake pioneer, celebrated her 76th birthday anniversary Tuesday. Although Miss Hoyt is at present confined to her bed because of illness, she enjoyed a very happy day. Friends showered her with birthday cards, and flowers and she received numerous callers.

Miss Hoyt is the oldest person in Walled Lake to be born and live here an entire lifetime. She is a daughter of Dr. James M. Hoyt, whom older residents will remember, and was born in a house located on the lot now occupied by the Roach and Avery building and the Berlin Building. Her father was a practicing physician here and also kept a store at this location.

Miss Hoyt studied to be a teacher at Ypsilanti Normal College and taught at Commerce, in the Pennell District, Sanford district and in "The Home of the Friendless" in Detroit.

Miss Hoyt has been active in the Baptist church since finishing school and nearly all of this time has been a Sunday school teacher in that church. Thursday, January 21 she was elected for the 43rd time to the office of church clerk.

Miss Hoyt has a host of friends and says that she is more than thankful for the flowers, cards, and all the kindnesses that she has received during her illness.

Manufacturer Writes Of Economic And Industrial Conditions In Russia

H. G. Roach received letters of interest from William H. Smith, of Moscow, Russia recently. Mr. Smith is a former resident of the Hickory Hill subdivision.

Mr. Smith is in charge of machining in a Russian factory employing 30,000 men and is enjoying his work there. At this factory Mr. Smith writes, they have been manufacturing tractors, patrol wagons, and ambulances and are now making the first automobile made in Russia.

He writes that the weather has been around 30 below zero and that he and his wife are attending school there learning to speak Russian.

He says that to receive groceries persons must stand in line for several hours and that meat, butter and eggs cannot be purchased.

MOVEMENT TOWARD UNIFORM TRAFFIC LAWS IS STARTED

Michigan Department Of State Leads Way; Would Include All Eastern States

Lansing, Mich., Jan. 27—A movement toward uniform traffic and motor vehicle registration laws in all states east of the Mississippi river has been started by the Michigan Department of State. In this regard the department is acting under authority of a resolution adopted by both houses of the 1931 legislature.

Negotiations towards uniformity and reciprocity have been under way in 14 mid-Western states for several months and it is very likely that the legislatures of all these states will be asked to pass laws next year to standardize traffic and motor vehicle laws. If this succeeds the motorist who knows the laws of one state will be equally conversant with the laws of adjoining states.

In widening the scope of efforts toward uniformity, Orville E. Atwood, chief of the motor vehicle license division, has asked that these subjects be made the main topics of the meeting of the Eastern Association of Motor Vehicle Registration Officials, to be held in Washington, D. C. during April or May. This association embraces 22 states in the Eastern part of the United States and two Canadian provinces. Several of the member states have attended meetings of the mid-Western group.

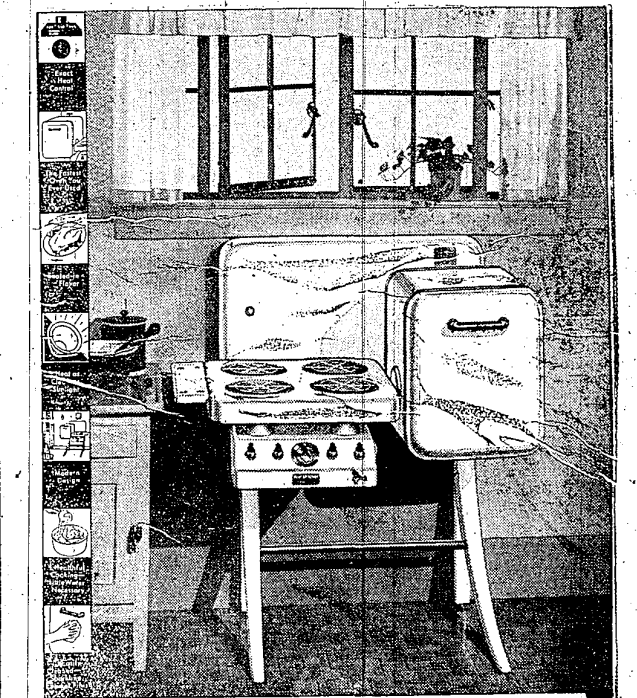
