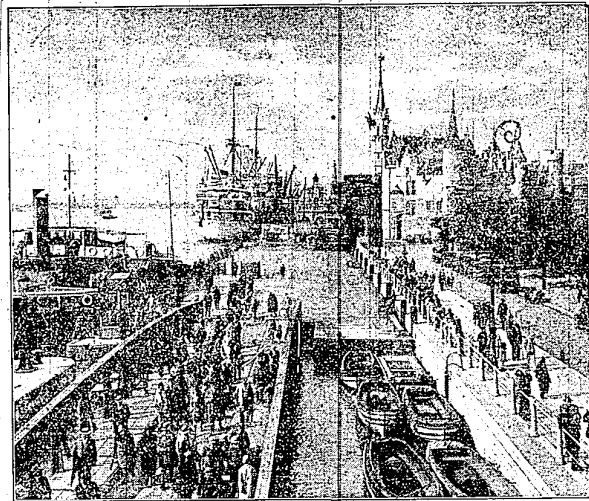

"J'accuse, Anvers" or its Flemish equivalent "Ik kluster, Antwerpen"—literally, "I listen, Antwerp." In other Belgian cities, the same expressions are used, the name of the town where the exchange is situated being substituted, of course, for that of Antwerp. Many calls placed by Belgian operators are for points on the United States, Antwerp and Brussels were the first cities on the European continent to be connected with the transatlantic radio telephone circuit. Service was extended to their 100,000 telephones in January, 1928, and in October of the same year was further extended to include all of the telephones in Belgium, then estimated at a total of approximately 220,000. A glance at Antwerp's harbor front gives some indication of the activity of this important seaport.
