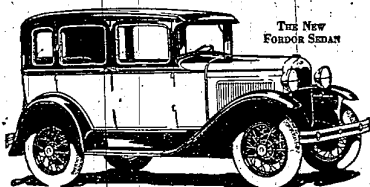

VIEWS ON STATE PROBLEMS TOLD BY GOV. BRUCKER

Says Views Must Be Focused Before Special Session Would Be Worth While

State problems and his views upon some of the more important questions were outlined to publishers of Michigan Weekly newspapers by Governor William M. Brucker at the annual meeting of the Michigan Press Association last Thursday evening at Michigan State College, East Lansing. The largest number ever gathered at an annual banquet, except on occasions when the legislature has been in session and its members were guests, attended the banquet.

Governor Brucker said that the flood of mail coming into his office daily indicated that the matters uppermost in the minds of Michigan people are unemployment, the problem of stabilizing jobs, and relief of taxes on real estate. The State has provided jobs he said, by putting at work on highways thousands of men who would otherwise be unemployed.

Regarding a special session, the Governor said that he was unwilling to call the legislators into special session until there is more likelihood of their accomplishing something worth while at such a session. The views on our problems are as yet so many and so conflicting, he declared, that a special session would probably result in disagreement as to what should be done. Until the many and varying viewpoints can be reconciled to a greater extent so that there is probability that they could be crystallized into action by the legislature, he said, he is unwilling to cause a special session, "with all the incidents thereto."

Opinion in favor of broader state taxes on intangible property has been growing, the Governor said, among the leading ideas being a State income tax, and another being diversion of the gas taxes. He said that that he would favor new forms of taxation only upon the basis of there being at the same time a corresponding reduction in the real estate taxes, but that he would oppose any new taxes that did not have this effect. The Governor expressed himself inclined to concur in the State Highway Department's opposition to diversion of the gas tax to relieve real estate taxes, on the theory that the tourist business is Michigan's second largest industry, and that maintaining and increasing the income from this source depends on fulfilling our highway program. Feeling for Covert road tax relief is great, the governor said, referring to the conference he has called on that subject.

Other speakers at the session included, Prof. John Lewis Brumm, University of Michigan; President Robert Shaw, Michigan State College; Clarence V. Smael, Michigan Municipal League; C. George, Jr., Campbell-Ewald Co., Detroit; John L. Lovett, Michigan Manufacturers' Assn.
