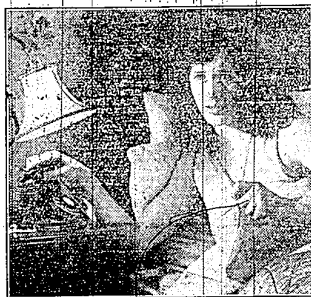

## Farmington Basketball Team Seeks State Championship; Wins 3 Games

Fresh from two brilliant vic-  
tories in the District basketball  
tournament and in quest of new  
laurels at the Regional tourna-  
ment at Lake Orion, Farming-  
ton high school's basketball team  
was to meet the strong St. Jose-  
ph team of Detroit in the third  
game of the evening, Thursday  
night.

Farmington gained the Class C  
championship of the district Fri-  
day night by conquering Milford  
in the final game of the tourna-  
ment after upsetting the favored  
Walled Lake five the previous  
night in a sensational game, 20-19.  
The score of the Milford game  
was 14-8.

Farmington's victory over Wal-  
led Lake was extremely unusual  
due to a new ruling regarding  
games with a tie score at the end  
of the regulation time in tourna-  
ments, which was the case in the  
Walled Lake-Farmington game.

No overtime play is permis-  
sible, according to Curtiss Hall,  
coach of the Farmington team.  
The winner of the game in case of  
a tie is figured mathematically on

the following basis. Five points is  
to be awarded the team scoring the  
greatest number of field goals,  
four points the team scoring the  
greater percentage of free throws  
and three points the team commit-  
ting the least number of personal  
fouls. Officials, in analyzing the  
Thursday night game, found  
both teams tied in field goals and  
percentage of foul shots made but  
a personal foul called on a Walled  
Lake player in the last moment  
of play swung the balance to Far-  
mington. The resulting free throw  
from this foul enabled Farming-  
ton to tie the score at Walled  
Lake was leading by a point until  
just before the gun.

The final game will be played  
Saturday night at 8:30 p. m.  
The winner will be entitled to en-  
ter the State tournament at Mich-  
igan State College the following  
week.

Farmington players who are  
expected to see action are Bill  
Cairns, Harold Westfall, Harley  
Spallier, Elmer Cathman, Lewis  
Maas, Ray Fendt and Gwen Lan-  
caster.
