Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls

Public Acts 1929—No. 306. Chapter VIII

Section 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until six o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. PROVIDED, That in Townships the Board of inspectors of election may, at its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution, provide that the Polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

The Polls of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 8 o'clock p. m. Eastern Standard Time, of said day of election unless the Board of Election Inspectors shall, in their discretion, adjourn the Polls at 12 o'clock noon, for one hour.

And don't forget, young people, Miss Natalie Knapp will lead the service again this coming Sunday night at 8:30.

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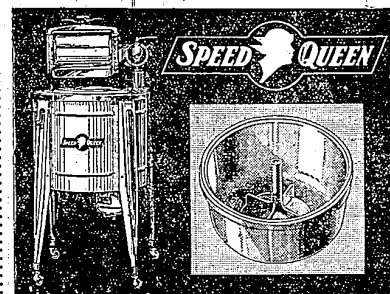
## FARMINGTON TEAM FINALLY BOWS IN DEFEAT AT ORION

Blue and White Wins Four Tournament Games Before Being Eliminated

Farmington High School's drive for a State basketball championship came to an abrupt end Saturday night but not before the Farmington cagers had cut a wide swath of their own among the ranks of championship aspirants in this region. Farmington was eliminated from further consideration by St. Mary's of Royal Oak in the finals of the Regional tournament, 20-17. Had Farmington won it would have entered the State finals at East Lansing this week.

Coach Hall's cagers rose to great heights in beating Walled Lake, a team that already had two victories over Farmington this season in scheduled games. Farmington was not pressed by Milford the following night when the Blue and White won the District pennant, nor in the first two games of the Regional games when St. Joseph's of Detroit and Lake Orion were disposed of in similar fashion. St. Mary's however, proved a hurdle too high for Farmington to clear.
