

Technology brings more natural gas to Michigan



For the past year Michigan has been affected by the national shortage of natural gas, and by the limited supplies available by pipeline from other states. At the same time, the demand for natural gas—one of the cleanest sources of energy—has continued to rise. Now, thanks to a technological braskthrough developed by the British Gas Council in 1964, between the course of the council of the coun
