The president called for nominations to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Lloyd Gullen. Mrs. Allen Nelson nominated Spencer Heene and Fred Stemann supported the nomination.

A motion was made by Arthur Lamb, supported by Floyd Nichols that the nominations be closed and the Secretary instructed to cast an unanimous ballot for Spencer Heene. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Lloyd Gullen, supported by Floyd Nichols that the rules concerning a written ballot be set aside and the Secretary cast the ballot. Motion carried.

Spencer Heene was declared elected school trustee for a term of three years.

A motion was made, supported and carried that meeting adjourn.

Annual Report

SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 8, NOVI

The Annual Meeting of School District No. 8 held at the school house called to order by President Atkinson.

The reading of minutes of last Annual Meeting was the first order of the business by Secretary Mairs, which were approved on motion of Delos Leavenworth supported by Orren Hulett.

The reading of the financial report by Treasurer J. O. Munro followed; on motion by A. L. Hill supported by Frank Martin report was approved.

The President then read the budget for the ensuing year. The question of the amount the district would pay on tuition was then taken up. Considerable discussion followed. Motion by Wm. Hazen Jr., supported by Mrs. A. C. Atkinson that the District pay a maximum amount of \$90.00 tuition per pupil for the ensuing year. Motion lost. Moved by Leavenworth, supported by Mrs. C. E. Holmes that the District pay \$60.00 tuition per pupil for the ensuing year. Carried. A. L. Hill raised the question of the notices posted for the annual meeting it being his opinion that had the notices specified that, this question would be taken up that many more electors would have attended the meeting and the motion to pay \$90.00 per pupil would have prevailed. The chair however ruled the notices posted were as prescribed by law it not being necessary to specify this particular subject as this was a question that must be settled each year by the electorate.

Motion by Fred Brooks supported by Wm. Hazen Jr., that the question of tuition be reconsidered; a rising vote being taken the motion prevailed.

On motion by Brooks supported by Wm. Hazen Jr., that the District pay a maximum amount of \$75.00 per pupil instead of \$60.00, carried by a vote of 13 ayes and 6 nays.

The election of a trustee for a term of 3 years was taken up, the chair calling for nominations, Frank Martin nominated Atkinson, Delos Leavenworth supporting. Atkinson declined the nomination saying that he could not under any circumstances accept the office if elected. No other nominations were made, and Mr. Mairs taking the chair called for the vote which was unanimous. Atkinson protested but however was prevailed upon and accepted.

Supervisor Hamilton who was a visitor was called on by the chair to address the meeting and gave a very interesting talk on taxation which was well taken by the entire gathering.

No further business appearing, meeting adjourned.
