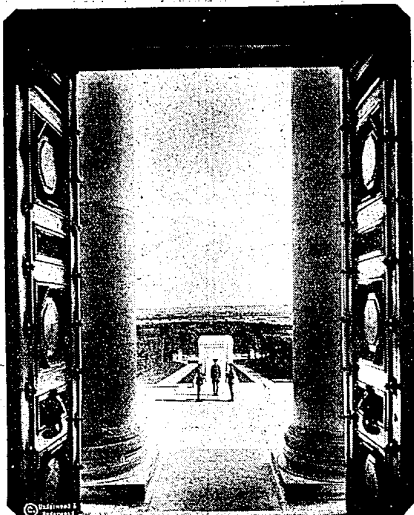


## Spirit of Armistice Day, 1932

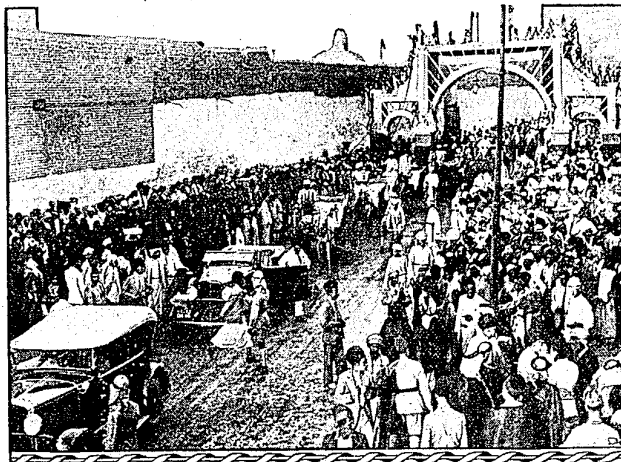
## CANADA'S MEMORIAL



The Canadian National War memorial which was built in London by a number of sculptors is shown being erected in Hyde park, London, prior to its removal to Canada.

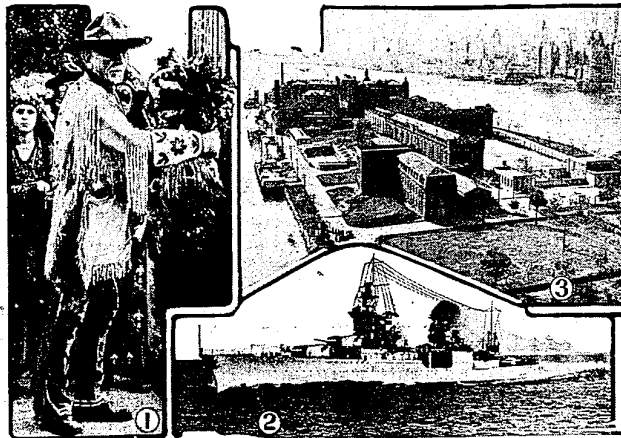
**Sales of Smuggled Goods**

## Money Is Needed to Preserve the Logan Elm



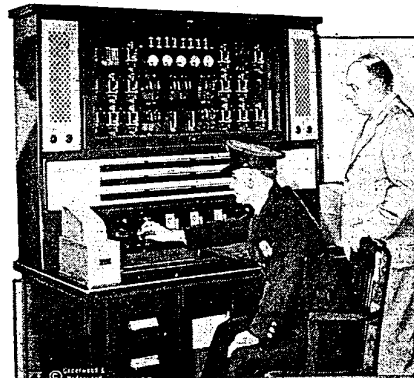

## Two Hammers on Kansas Grid Team



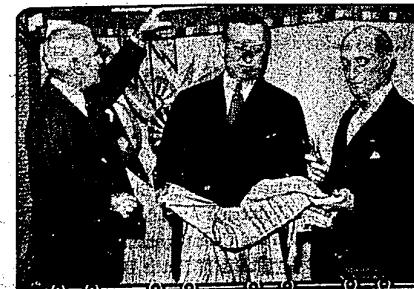
