PASSING ATTACK OF WALLED LAKE DEFEATS TRITONS

Farmington Unable To Break Up Harris-Tuttle Combination; Losses, 39 to 6

Inability to stop the passing combination of Harris to D. Tuttle, and the running of Harris, was fatal to Farmington. High School in its game with Walled Lake at Farmington Saturday. The final score was 39 to 6 in favor of Walled Lake.

Because of these two players, Walled Lake scored six touchdowns almost as easily as it could have made two. Its plays were scoring plays, and if they could be worked at all, they could be used over and over again.

Farmington fought itself out in the first half. In the first quarter they came back to tie the score at 6 to 6, after Harris went over for a touchdown from the eight-yard line. The Tritons rallied hard after this score. Spaller hit the line for consistent gains, and Captain Hamilton shook loose several tacklers and scored a touchdown on a 35-yard run wide around end. Spaller missed a dropkick for the extra point.

Walled Lake made another touchdown in the second quarter on a pass. Harris to Tuttle, but Farmington was exhausted in holding the score to 13 to 6 at the half. The visitors had little difficulty in scoring two touchdowns in each of the last two periods, two on passes, and two on runs by Harris and Tuttle.

The Farmington line fought hard, and Walled Lake was unable to gain consistently through it. Hamilton pushed well and carried the ball well, and Spaller's plunging and tacking counted for much in the backfield for Farmington.

CITY CLERK POWER WINS PRIZES FOR PREDICTING VOTES

Gets Most Accurate Total, Has Five States Wrong In Exchange Club Contest

Predicting only five states wrong in the presidential election and with a total only two electoral votes away from the final figures, City Clerk N. H. Power won both one-dollar prizes offered Farmington Exchange Club members by Superintendent John Dalrymple. The prizes were awarded at the club meeting Wednesday. Spencer Heeneey was second in both contests.

Mr. Power gave president Hoover 57 electoral votes instead of the 59 he received, and placed Massachusetts, New Jersey and Rhode Island in the Republican column, with Pennsylvania and Delaware Democratic. There were very close races in nearly all the states listed wrong.

Before giving Mr. Power his prizes, Superintendent Dalrymple reviewed previous presidential elections and analyzed the development of the system of naming a president, including the passage of the 12th amendment and the gradual decadence of the electoral college.

To the Editor:

I read with appreciation your editorial in the issue of October 20th, regarding the care of the poor as it concerns the physician. I have always felt that the attitude you have shown would be that of most thinking people with regard to the care of the indigent sick. Throughout this depression the physician has responded at all times of the day and night knowing that he would not be reimbursed for his services.

However, it would appear that a fairly large number of our officials have taken for granted that it was the function of the physician to continue indefinitely caring for this increasingly large number of indigent parties without any remuneration for professional services, upkeep of car and dispensing of supplies. Furthermore, they often do not even see fit to express their appreciation.

In good times and bad it is the first charge on any government to see that the indigent sick are cared for adequately. Needless to say a civilization that makes the high claims regarding service to our fellow man that we proclaim. Furthermore, the responsibility for the dispensing of this care should be in medical hands. Allowing the final authority for hospitalization to rest in non-medical hands is an injustice to the sick. Your outline of the situation is very refreshing. Needless to say the physicians appreciate your stand very much.
