U. O. M. LOAN FUNDS

Ann Arbor—\$10,000 is the goal set in the drive this week among University of Michigan students, to build up the University loan funds which have been heavily taxed to aid needy students this year. Campus honor societies, including Michiganans, Druids, Vulcans, Sphinx, Triangles, the Interfraternity Council, the student Christian Association, Sigma Delta Chi, the freshman association, the Union underclass committee and other groups have volunteered to canvass thoroughly "town and gown." The need of increased loan funds for the University was emphasized by President Raitven in his recent annual report.

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Special meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington held January 16, 1933. This meeting was called to transact any city business that may legally come before the commission.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:33 p. m.

Commissioners present: Stamann, Hamlin, Goers, Gildemeister, Hutton and Osmus.

The following resolution was adopted: Moved by Hutton supported by Hamlin that the City of Farmington enter into an agreement with the Township of Farmington to pay said Township the sum of One hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00), said amount being a part of Loan received from Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The following Agreement to wit: That on the first day of July 1934 and each consecutive year thereafter up to and including July first, 1938. That the City of Farmington agrees to pay to the Clerk of the Township of Farmington the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) and interest at 3% The above being same rate of interest paid by said Township to the State of Michigan.

This agreement to be valid as agreed on by both parties named unless the State Legislature should pass such legislation whereby the Loans do not have to be paid back to the State. In which case this Agreement becomes null and void, same as agreement between the State of Michigan and Farmington Township.

Yeas, Osmus, Goers, Gildemeister, Hamlin, Stamann and Hutton. Nays, none.

Motion made by Hamlin, seconded by Osmus that the Clerk write to Mr. Oakes of the State Highway Department and ask that the traffic light at the corner of Orchard and Lake Avenue and Grand River be transferred to Farmington Road and the Cut-off. Carried.

Mayor Lamb submitted the following re-adjustment of salaries for City officers and employees, effective February 1, 1933.

Mayor Lamb attendance at Board of Supervisors, Pontiac, \$4.00 per day instead of \$5.00 as prescribed by the charter.

Commissioners' attendance at monthly meetings \$3.00 instead of \$4.00.

Lee Doyle, night police, \$100.00 per month instead of \$125.00.

Tom Arantowicz, day police, \$50.00 a month instead of \$100.00.

Supt. of Public Works, \$90.00 per month, instead of \$125.00, effective April 1.

Assistant Supt. of Public Works \$55.00 a month, including rent, light, water, and fuel, effective April 1. The last two named officials are on half time at present.

City Treasurer, \$40.00 a month instead of \$50.00. He is allowed for gas on official trips to Redford.

City Assessor \$350.00 a year instead of \$450.00.

City Clerk \$300.00 a year instead of \$340.00.

That the city pay not to exceed \$1500.00 a month for street lighting.
