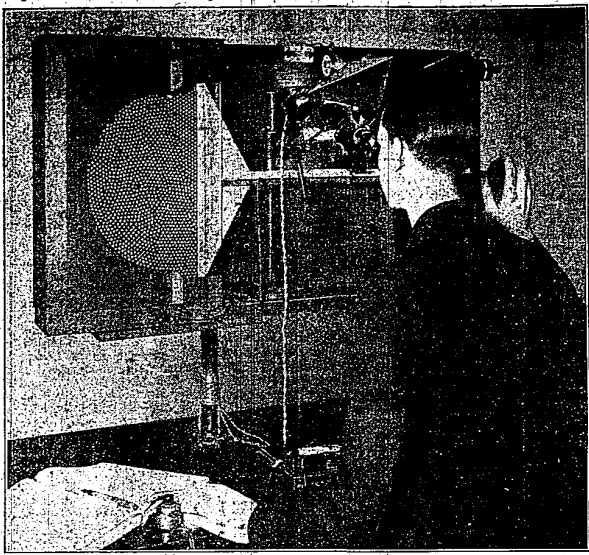

Model Shows What Happens Inside Your Telephone



THIS DEVICE DEMONSTRATES A PRINCIPLE WHICH OPERATES EVERY TIME YOU MAKE A CALL. The round objects in the model above are graphite-coated rubber balls, which represent the carbon granules in the ordinary telephone transmitter. When the plunger is pushed in, the balls are compressed just as the transmitter diaphragm, vibrating to voice waves, is thought to compress the carbon granules. Just behind the diaphragm of your telephone, which vibrates to the sound waves of your voice as you speak into the transmitter, is a little chamber holding some 70,000 tiny granules of crushed and roasted coal. As the diaphragm moves back and forth, the granules are agitated, and the electrical current which flows through them becomes a faithful copy of the original sound waves of your voice. In this large model, rubber balls coated with graphite represent the tiny carbon granules, and the compression and expansion of the balls, increasing and decreasing the area of their contact with one another as the plunger is moved in and out, is strikingly similar to what happens to the granules when the transmitter diaphragm moves in and out. Just what takes place among these granules is a problem engaging scientists of Bell Telephone Laboratories who are carrying on fundamental studies of the telephone transmitter.
