Paul Muni Excels In Chain Gang Tale

The actual dynamiting of a bridge in a convict's dash for freedom is but one of the many spectacular scenes in "I Am A Fugitive From A Chain Gang," a Warner Bros. picture which will start a three-day run at the Great Lakes Theatre on Sunday, February 5th.

Paul Muni, the "Scarface" of the screen from a stolen careening truck, throws a stick of dynamite to blow up a bridge almost under the feet of his pursuing posse. This scene was taken at the Warner Bros. ranch in Hollywood where an actual bridge constructed by the studio over the Los Angeles River, was utterly demolished.

Scenes such as these depicting the stirring adventures of a convict who twice performs miraculous escapes from chain gangs make the picture one of the most powerful dramas of recent years, according to the critical Hollywood preview audiences.

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TONS OF FISH CAUGHT

Lansing, Mich.—In ten years the Great Lakes have produced almost a million tons of commercial fish.

Figures issued by the U. S. during the period 1921-31 show that the five Great Lakes and the Lake of the Woods, Rainy Lake, and Nemadji Lake have yielded a take of 989,478,000 pounds of commercial fish, or 494,736 tons. The report does not include a considerable catch from the Detroit River, St. Clair River and Lake St. Clair.
